## Monday 14<sup>th</sup> July

- Find a moment where you can get sight of the sky. (It can be in real life or through an image you have) Let your mind wander and imagine who else might be looking up at the sky where they are. Consider the vast expanse of the sky. The many places it covers and the people who see it. Thank God for the gloriousness of the whole earth and all the people living under its sky.

#### Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> July

- Since 2023, the 15th July has been marked by the EU as Victims of the Global Climate Crisis.
- Today, let us hold in our prayers all who are affected by the changing climate, recognising that most of the blame lies with wealthy countries whilst most of the effects are felt by those living in poverty.
- Bring hope, in the midst of this disaster, we pray. Amen.

#### Wednesday 16th July

- God of all grace,

Show me how to bring love into my community today. Show me how to be a person of safety, sanctuary and encouragement to those around me.

Come, by your Spirit, Amen.

#### Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> July

- Today is the saint day for Pope Leo IV, who was Pope in the ninth century, which offers us a reminder to pray for all our religious leaders today.
- For the current Pope, still early in his leadership, for senior leaders of all Christian denominations, for all who feel the responsibility of power and the calling of ministry and seek to find a balance between these often-opposing forces in our world.

#### Friday 18<sup>th</sup> July

- Pour yourself a glass of water. As you do so give thanks for its easy access, its cleanliness & its restoring properties. Pray for those where access to water is limited or impossible and feels like a luxury. Pay attention to what you might do in your life that might help those in places where water is a scarce commodity.

## Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> July

- Attention to your hands:
- Spend a moment with your hands on your lap. Hold them open before God. Reflect on whose hands you have held in yours, the people you have shaken hands with, the gentle touch of friendship you have offered and received. Rest in the blessings of those encounters and give thanks.

## Deuteronomy 30: 9-14

<sup>9</sup>and the LORD your God will make you abundantly prosperous in all your undertakings, in the fruit of your body, in the fruit of your livestock, and in the fruit of your soil. For the LORD will again take delight in prospering you, just as he delighted in prospering your ancestors, <sup>10</sup>when you obey the LORD your God by observing his commandments and decrees that are written in this book of the law, because you turn to the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul.

11 Surely, this commandment that I am commanding you today is not too hard for you, nor is it too far away. <sup>12</sup>It is not in heaven, that you should say, 'Who will go up to heaven for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?' <sup>13</sup>Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, 'Who will cross to the other side of the sea for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?' <sup>14</sup>No, the word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe.

#### Luke 10: 25-37

<sup>25</sup> A lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' <sup>26</sup>He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' <sup>27</sup>He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' <sup>28</sup>And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.'

<sup>29</sup> But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' <sup>30</sup>Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. <sup>31</sup>Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. <sup>32</sup>So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33But a Samaritan while travelling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. <sup>34</sup>He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. <sup>35</sup>The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend."

<sup>36</sup> 'Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' <sup>37</sup>He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'
